Savannah Church team visits Ghana

The new partnership between GCM and the Savannah Christian Church in Savannah, Georgia, USA, was given a further boost by the visit of a 5-member team from the church last April. This was a follow-up to an earlier visit paid by two leaders from that church last year.

The purpose of their visit was to see for themselves the work that GCM is doing toward the “total emancipation” of God’s people from the grips of the devil, and helping to deliver them from the powers of darkness. These we do through evangelism, provision of quality and affordable health care, and water, among other relief activities for the poverty-stricken and unreached areas in Ghana.

The team held many encouragement seminars for our urban and village church leaders and pastors. They also held public health education seminars and shared the Gospel with junior high school pupils and

adults in some communities. In all, over 1,600 pupils and adults in different schools and communities gathered to hear the life-changing Good News of Christ, and how to avoid preventable diseases so they can live healthy spiritual and physical lives.

As a sign of their compassion for the sick and underprivileged, the team also visited the leper colony at Ho in the Volta Region, where they offered prayers for the inmates, and made donations in cash and kind for their upkeep.

The team certainly was a group of faithful, dedicated, and zealous servants in the Lord’s vineyard. May our risen Lord Jesus Christ cement the relationship between GCM and Savannah Christian Church by opening up more areas of cooperation between the two mission groups.

Truck purchased for clinic

Join us to sing praises to the Lord for fulfilling yet another promise in our ministry. A couple of years ago, we started praying and asking God to provide at least one pick-up truck for each of our medical clinics, all of which are located in rural and remote areas in our Ghana.

A few weeks ago, our faithful and prayer-answering God provided the needed funds to purchase a brand new Deer pick-up truck valued at \$15,000 for the clinic at Makango in the Northern region.

When the keys of the truck were presented to Elizabeth, the midwife in charge of the clinic, at a brief ceremony, the ecstatic crowd could not control their feelings of excitement.

For them, the truck has come at an opportune time because the end has come for their woes. Until now, serious cases needing to be transferred to the hospital at Salaga, a distance of 18 miles, were compelled to ride on motorcycles, bicycles, and sometimes had to struggle for space in big cargo trucks. In most cases, the patients could not make it to the hospital.

Elizabeth just beamed throughout the ceremony. She

was nearly killed in a motorcycle accident last year while she was riding to Salaga on an official duty.

The truck, apart from serving as a safer and more effective means of transportation for referred patients, will also be used by Elizabeth and her assistants to get to the surrounding villages to serve patients, buy medicines, and take care of other needs of the clinic.

The District Chief Executive for Salaga, the Chief of Makango, and the Director of Health Services, who were all present

at the ceremony, took turns to express their gratitude for the truck.

The Regional Director of Health Services was not left out of the euphoria when the truck

was shown to him in his office at Tamale later in the day.

We pause to express our heartfelt gratitude to our donors, especially our brethren in Kingsway Christian Church in Indiana, who contributed the bulk of the funds toward the purchase of the truck. We still appeal to other faithful partners, sponsors, friends, and well-wishers of our mission, to make donations toward the purchase of more trucks for the Lord's work in His vineyards.
